Purpose of This Guide

This guide helps parish formation leaders implement an eleven-month Confirmation journey. The language and structure are designed to be practical, family-friendly, and adaptable to parish culture.

Sacrament of Confirmation Defined by the Catechism of the Catholic Church

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION

CCC1285: Baptism, the Eucharist, and the Sacrament of Confirmation together constitute the “sacraments of Christian initiation,” whose unity must be safeguarded. It must be explained to the faithful that the reception of is necessary for the completion of baptismal grace. For “by the Sacrament of Confirmation, [the baptized] are more perfectly bound to the Church and are enriched with a special strength of the Holy Spirit. Hence they are, as true witnesses of Christ, more strictly obliged to spread and defend the faith by word and deed.”

Spiritual Strengthening: It provides a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit, like that given to the Apostles at Pentecost, to empower the faithful to spread and defend the faith by word and deed.

Indelible Mark: Like Baptism, it imprints a permanent spiritual character on the soul. It can only be received once, empowering the confirmed person to officially profess their faith publicly.

Confirmation Overview

The Confirmation Sacrament completes the Christian Initiation which began when the parents chose the Sacrament of Baptism for their child. From baptism, the parents have nurtured the child’s faith life through exposure, teachings and practices of the faith. The parents will continue to form their child’s discipleship through the preparations to the Sacrament of Confirmation with the assistance of their parish formation team and the larger church. Through the preparation of Confirmation, the child and parents will journey through the faith on a mission of Belonging and Identity with Encounters to become a Missionary Disciple of Christ.

Through this document, the standards and objectives for Belonging, Identity, Encounters and Mission which include active participation from the child, the parent(s), the sponsor, the pastor, the Confirmation team and the parish family.

A Message from the Bishop of the Diocese of Des Moines, Most Reverend William Joensen

“Confirmation is a sacrament that's meant to strengthen baptismal grace and anchor a young person's identity in Christ. By celebrating the sacrament in sixth grade, we continue to build a solid faith foundation upon which our young people will sow God's spirit as they enter adolescence. It is our firm belief and hope that they will be emboldened with the gifts of wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, courage, and a devoted love for Jesus and his father, along with all God's saints. We infer that earlier

confirmation better serves families and equips young people to see themselves as on mission to live as Jesus did and to share his love with others.”

- Confirmandi with disabilities should be presumed capable of receiving catechesis, participating in parish life, and receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation unless a specific pastoral concern requires further discernment. Preparation should focus on helping the individual encounter Jesus Christ and grow in faith rather than measuring academic achievement or memorization. See appendix for practices and adaptations.

- Parishes should begin with the understanding that persons with disabilities possess the same dignity, baptismal rights, and call to discipleship as every other member of the Church. The Church's responsibility is not simply to provide access, but to foster belonging, participation, and opportunities for spiritual growth

Sacrament of Confirmation Program Instructional Formation Sessions

The Confirmation programming follows the movements of understanding Belonging and Identity which lead to an Encounter enabling one to live the life of the Mission of the Catholic Church in the world.

The Diocese of Des Moines developed an eleven-month inclusive Confirmation Program utilizing connections to the Catechism of the Catholic Church and Scripture with a focus on fostering discipleship through personal experiences found in At-Home Discussions, Sponsor Chats and Service. Session includes a variety of immersive prayer opportunities and developmental age-appropriate activities, youth formation, parent formation, family engagement, and sponsor conversations.”

The following is a condensed objective summary of the monthly sessions as a template for parishes to use in their Confirmation Programming.

Diocese of Des Moines Confirmation Standards:

- Enrollment and participation in the parish Sacrament of Confirmation Program Instructional Formation Sessions.
- Selection of a Saint for the Confirmation preparation.
- Selection of a Sponsor for the Confirmation preparation and beyond.
- Completion of the At Home Conversations for the Confirmation Program.
- Completion of the Sponsor Chats.

DEFINING STANDARDS:

<i>Registered and Baptized</i> The family must be registered with the parish and proof of baptism will be provided if needed.	<i>Enrollment in Faith Formation, Catholic School, or Home School.</i> The confirmandi is required to be enrolled and participate in parish Faith Formation Program, attend Catholic School or are Home Schooled while preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation	<i>Saint Selection</i> The confirmandi will select a saint for the Sacrament of Confirmation. This Saint should be someone the child would like to strive to live like the Saint. This Saint will be someone they pray to for intercession as they prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation.
<i>Sponsor Selection</i> The confirmandi will select a sponsor to support and pray for them as they prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation. The selection should occur before the process begins. This person should be someone who the confirmandi would like to pattern their daily faith life after. The sponsor is to be a baptized and active Catholic disciple. A letter from one's registered parish priest showing the sponsor is in 'good standing with the Catholic Church' is required.	<i>At-Home Components</i> The confirmandi will complete a series of At-Home Components as found in the Confirmation Family Guide. Completion of these components will be given to the Parish Confirmation Leader.	<i>Sponsor Chats</i> The confirmandi will have Sponsor Chats to help deepen one's faith life and understanding over the year. Completion of these chats will be given to the Parish Confirmation Leader.
<i>Confirmation Instructional Program</i> The confirmandi and parents will attend the Confirmation Sessions to assist the parental preparations for the Sacrament of Confirmation.	<i>Family Service</i> Through service the power of the Holy Spirit becomes alive. Through service we bring joy to others and can see the face of God in others.	<i>Retreat</i> During a retreat or conference the confirmandi has the time away from distractions to engage in purposeful conversation, prayer, or learning from a speaker while internally listening for God's words and direction in life.

Pastors are to support and reinforce these Confirmation standards, using their pastoral judgment to address individual circumstances without diminishing the intent of the norms.

Parishes have the opportunity to individualize one of these Confirmation Delivery Models.

Family Based	Monthly In Person Sessions at the parish with confirmandi and parent(s) <u>participating in the Confirmation Program as a group</u> with home-based objectives to be met before gathering next month.	Group size: • Under 20 families → 2 to 3 catechists are usually sufficient. • 20–40 families → 3 to 4 catechists ensures smooth facilitation. • 40+ families → 4 to 6 catechists or more, depending on space and logistics. Pastor involvement: If the pastor leads the teaching portion, catechists shift into support roles (discussion facilitation, hospitality, logistics), reducing the number needed. Session format: If sessions include multiple small-group breakouts, you need more catechists. If

		sessions stay mostly in large-group teaching + family discussion, fewer catechists are required. Recommended staffing for most parishes: • Lead catechist/coordinator: oversees sessions, communicates with families • Assistant catechist: supports teaching, manages materials • Family-group facilitator(s): 2-4 people who help guide discussions, assist families, and manage flow • Total: 2–6 catechists, with flexibility for pastor discretion.
Parent & Child Based	Monthly In-Person Sessions at the parish with fellowship before <u>separating into a parent group and a confirmandi group</u> for individual formation for their role in the Confirmation Preparations. There are home-based objectives to be met before gathering next month.	Group size • Under 20 families → 3 to 4 catechists are usually sufficient. (Two catechists are needed because parents and confirmandi separate into <i>two formation groups</i>, plus 1–2 additional facilitators.) • 20–40 families → 4 to 6 catechists ensure smooth facilitation. (Larger groups require more small-group support, especially during parent formation.) • 40+ families → 6 to 8 catechists or more,

		depending on space and logistics. (Both parent and youth groups need multiple facilitators to maintain quality formation.) Pastor involvement: If the pastor leads the teaching portion for either the parent group or the confirmandi group, catechists shift into support roles such as discussion facilitation, hospitality, and logistics. This can reduce the total number needed. Session format: If sessions include multiple small-group breakouts (especially for parents), more catechists are required. If sessions stay mostly in large-group teaching with guided discussion, fewer catechists are needed. Recommended staffing for most parishes • Lead catechist/coordinator: oversees sessions, communicates with families • Parent-group catechist: leads formation for parents • Youth catechist: leads formation for confirmandi • Group facilitators (2–4 people): assist with discussions,
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		help families, manage flow • Total: 3–8 catechists, with flexibility for pastor discretion.
Family Small Group	A Family Small Group Confirmation model blends the strengths of family-based formation with the intimacy and accountability of small-group discipleship. It creates a rhythm where families journey together—not just as individual households, but as a small community of 3–5 families who support one another throughout the Confirmation year.	Group size • Under 24 families → 2 to 4 catechists are usually sufficient. (This typically means 2 to 3 small groups of families, two sets of three families facilitated by a catechist or trained volunteer.) • 24–42 families → 4 to 7 catechists ensures smooth facilitation. (More small groups require additional facilitators to maintain intimacy and accountability.) • 42+ families → 7 to 10 catechists or more, depending on space and logistics. (Large cohorts need multiple small-group facilitators plus support for coordination and flow.) Pastor involvement: If the pastor leads the teaching portion or the monthly spiritual reflection, catechists shift into support roles (small-group facilitation, hospitality, logistics). This can reduce the total number needed.

		Session format: If sessions include multiple small-group breakouts (the norm in this model), more catechists or trained facilitators are required. If sessions stay mostly in large-group teaching with limited breakout time, fewer catechists are needed. Recommended staffing for most parishes: • Lead catechist/coordinator oversees sessions, communicates with families • Assistant catechist: supports teaching, manages materials • Family-group facilitators (2–4 people): guide small-group discussions, assist families, manage flow Total: 2–7 catechists, with flexibility for pastor discretion.
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Statement of Understanding of Roles for Confirmandi, Parent and Sponsor

Month 3: Belonging -- Whole Group Delivery Method

Length: 90 Minutes

Audience: Confirmandi and Parent(s) together

Theme: "Belonging Through Service"

Scripture: Matthew 25:35-40

Catechism: CCC 2447

Session Objective: The baptized confirmandi and their family discover belonging is expressed through service within the Church and community by actively living out the Works of Mercy.

Session Flow (90 Minutes)

Welcome & Community Building (10 Minutes)

Activity: "Where Do I Belong?" As families arrive, have them answer on a sticky note:

- A place where I feel I belong
- A person who helps me feel included

Post answers on a wall or bulletin board.

Leader Connection: Explain that God created us for relationship and community. The Church is not simply a building; it is a family where everyone belongs and everyone has a role.

Opening Prayer (5 Minutes)

Prayer Leader

Loving Father, You call each of us by name and make us part of Your family. Help us recognize Jesus in the people around us. Open our hearts to serve others with love and mercy. May the Holy Spirit guide us to become disciples who help others feel welcomed and valued. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Scripture Proclamation & Reflection (15 Minutes)

Read Matthew 25:35-40

After the reading ask:

1. Who is Jesus talking about in this Gospel?
2. What surprised you about His message?
3. How are serving others and serving Jesus connected?
4. What might this look like for youth today?

Key Teaching Point

Jesus teaches that belonging to Him means caring for others. Christians show they belong to Christ by recognizing His presence in those who are hungry, lonely, sick, or in need.

Large Group Teaching: The Works of Mercy (15 Minutes)

Introduce the concept of the Works of Mercy from CCC 2447.

Corporal Works of Mercy

- Feed the hungry
- Give drink to the thirsty
- Clothe the naked
- Shelter the homeless
- Visit the sick
- Visit the imprisoned
- Bury the dead

Spiritual Works of Mercy

- Counsel the doubtful
- Instruct the ignorant
- Admonish sinners
- Comfort the afflicted
- Forgive offenses
- Bear wrongs patiently
- Pray for the living and the dead

Discussion Prompt

Ask:

Which of these Works of Mercy could you do this month?

Family Activity: Mercy Mapping (15 Minutes)

Provide each family with a worksheet divided into three circles:

Home

How can we serve people in our family?

Parish

How can we help at church?

School and Community

How can we serve beyond the parish?

Families write practical examples in each section.

Examples:

- Help younger siblings with homework
- Participate in parish hospitality
- Donate food to a pantry
- Help an elderly neighbor

Invite several families to share one idea from each category.

Interactive Activity: Service Challenge Stations (15 Minutes)

Set up four stations around the room.

Station 1: Food Pantry

Discuss local hunger needs.

Station 2: Parish Hospitality

Identify ways youth can welcome others.

Station 3: Community Cleanup

Brainstorm stewardship of creation.

Station 4: Encouragement Ministry

Write cards for nursing home residents, homebound parishioners, or parish volunteers.

Families spend about 3-4 minutes at each station.

Commitment & Family Service Planning (10 Minutes)

Explain that belonging grows through participation and service. Families choose a service activity to complete before the next session.

Possible options include:

- Food pantry service
- Meal ministry
- Community cleanup
- Parish hospitality ministry

These examples align with suggested family service opportunities within the diocesan guide.

Closing Prayer & Sending Forth (5 Minutes)

Invite families to stand.

Leader

Amen.

Closing Challenge:

This month, look for one person each day who may need kindness, encouragement, or help. Ask yourself: "How can I show them they belong?"

2. What service experience has impacted you the most?
3. How does serving others help us belong to Christ?

Opening Gathering (10 Minutes)

Welcome Activity: "Where Do I Belong?"

As families arrive, provide index cards.

Parents Answer:

- Where do you most feel connected to your parish?
- Who helped you feel welcomed in the Church?

Confirmandi Answer:

- Where do you feel you belong?
- Who makes you feel included?

Invite a few volunteers to share.

Leader Introduction

Explain: Every person desires to belong. God created us for relationship with Him and with others. The Church is more than a building. It is God's family where we are welcomed, loved, and called to serve.

Opening Prayer and Scripture (5 Minutes)

Read Matthew 25:35-40.

After the reading ask:

- What stands out?
- How is serving others connected to following Jesus?

Prayer: Lord Jesus, open our eyes to see You in others. Teach us to serve with joyful hearts. Help our families become signs of Your love in our parish and community.

Amen.

Confirmandi Formation Session (40 Minutes)

Theme: "I Belong to the Church"

Activity 1: Human Connection Web (10 Minutes)

Have youth stand in a circle.

Using a ball of yarn:

- One person shares a parish experience.
- They hold the string and toss it to another youth.
- Continue until a web forms.

Discussion:

- What happens if one person lets go?
- How is this like the Church?

Teaching Point: Each person is important within the Body of Christ.

Activity 2: Mercy in Action (15 Minutes)

Place signs around the room:

- Feed the hungry
- Visit the sick
- Comfort the sad
- Pray for others
- Forgive someone
- Welcome strangers

For each station youth identify:

1. What does this mean?
2. How can you do this?
3. Where have you seen this happen?

Explain the Works of Mercy and connect them to CCC 2447.

Activity 3: Service Scenario Challenge (10 Minutes)

Small groups receive scenarios:

- New student sitting alone.
- Neighbor recovering from surgery.
- Family using a food pantry.
- Elderly parishioner unable to attend Mass.

Ask:

- Which Work of Mercy applies?
- What would Jesus do?
- What could you do?

Groups report back.

Confirmandi Reflection (5 Minutes)

Journal Question:

How can I help someone know they belong this month?

Parent Formation Session (40 Minutes)

Theme: "Building Belonging Through Family Discipleship"

Opening Discussion (10 Minutes)

Ask parents:

- When did you first feel you belonged in the Catholic Church?
- Who encouraged your faith?
- What keeps families connected to parish life?

Parent Input: The Importance of Belonging (10 Minutes)

Facilitator shares:

- Children develop faith primarily through relationships.
- Parish participation strengthens family faith.
- Service teaches children that faith is active.

Discuss how belonging comes from:

- Worship
- Community
- Service
- Shared mission

This aligns with the Month Three objective of expressing belonging through service and community.

Small Group Discussion (15 Minutes)

Questions:

1. What prevents families from feeling connected?
2. What parish ministries have blessed your family?
3. Where could your family serve together?
4. How can service become a regular family habit?

Record ideas on chart paper.

Parent Reflection (5 Minutes)

Write down: One way our family can become more engaged in parish life before next month.

Confirmandi and Parent Reunion Activity (20 Minutes)

Bring parents and children back together.

Parish: How can we participate more fully?

School or Community: Who needs our help?

Belonging to Christ means participating in His mission. We encounter Jesus when we serve others.

Closing Prayer & Sending Forth (5 Minutes)

Invite everyone to pray together.

Jesus, Thank You for making us members of Your Church. Help us recognize Your presence in people who are hurting, lonely, and in need. Give us hearts willing to serve. Help our families grow in faith, community, and love. Amen.

Take-Home Components

Family Conversation

Discuss during the month:

1. Where have we experienced belonging in our parish?
2. Which Work of Mercy comes most naturally to our family?
3. Which Work of Mercy challenges us the most?
4. Where did we see Jesus in another person this week?

Sponsor Chat #1

Discuss with the sponsor:

- A place where you feel you belong in the Church.
- A Work of Mercy you would like to practice this month.
- How Matthew 25:35-40 helps you understand discipleship.

Family Service Assignment

Complete one family service activity and prepare to share:

- What you did
- Who you served
- Where you saw Christ in the experience

Small Group Delivery Method

Sample Session Month Three

What Stays the Same

- Matthew 25:35-40 Scripture reflection.
- Teaching on CCC 2447 and the Works of Mercy.
- Focus on service as an expression of belonging
- Family service challenge.
- Sponsor Chat #1 assignment.

What Changes

1. Less Teaching, More Discussion

Instead of a 15-minute lecture on the Works of Mercy, you might shorten it to 5-7 minutes and allow families to discuss:

"When has someone helped your family feel like you belong?"

"What parish ministries have impacted your family?"

Three families together will often generate richer conversations than a catechist presentation.

2. Families Learn From Each Other

In the Parent & Child Separated model, parents only hear from other parents and youth only hear from youth.

In the Family Small Group model:

- Parents share their experiences and service traditions.
- Youth hear faith stories from other adults.
- Families begin building parish friendships.

This directly reinforces the belonging objective.

3. A Shared Service Project Could Be Planned

Rather than each family choosing a separate project:

Option A

- Family A works at food pantry.
- Family B cleans parish grounds.
- Family C visits nursing home.

Option B (preferred) All three families choose one project:

- Parish hospitality Sunday
- Food pantry collection
- Community cleanup
- Advent giving tree project

The shared experience builds relationships between families.

4. Discussion Questions Become More Relational

Instead of: "How can your family serve?"

Ask: "How can our small group of families serve together?"

Or "What needs do we see in our parish right now?"

5. End With Intercessory Prayer

A beautiful ending would be:

Each family shares:

- One blessing
- One challenge
- One service commitment

Then the other families pray for them. This helps create the discipleship community envisioned by the Family Small Group model.

Understanding of discipleship changing — “How has your understanding of discipleship changed during the Confirmation process?” (Reflective and developmental.)

Using God-given gifts — “What gifts has God given you that can be used to strengthen your school, team, or parish community?” (Requires self-assessment and application.)

Future Catholic adult — “What kind of Catholic adult do you hope to become in the future?” (Abstract, forward-looking, and identity-based.)

Younger adolescents

Practicing faith at home — “How can you practice your faith more intentionally at home?” (Straightforward and rooted in daily habits.)

Parish’s role — “What role does your parish play in your faith journey?” (Helps them identify familiar supports.)

Showing Christ’s love — “How do you show Christ’s love to your family and friends?” (Concrete actions they can name easily.)

Challenges living faith openly — “What challenges make it difficult to live your faith openly?” (Younger teens can identify simple obstacles: peer pressure, busyness.)

Habits that connect to God — “What habits help you stay connected to God throughout the week?” (Fits their developmental stage and daily routines.)

Family support — “How can your family support one another in faith?” (Relatable and grounded in home life.)

Optional Questions for the Weeks after Confirmation

Older adolescents

Learning about yourself — “What did you learn about yourself through this experience?” (Requires introspection and self-evaluation.)

Challenged to live differently — “How has Confirmation challenged you to live differently?” (Invites deeper moral and spiritual reflection.)

Called to serve — “Where do you feel called to serve others?” (Connects identity to mission.)

Growing as a disciple — “How do you hope to continue growing as a disciple of Jesus?” (Forward-looking and reflective.)

Younger adolescents

Most memorable part — “What was the most memorable part of your Confirmation day?” (Straightforward and rooted in experience.)

Emotions during Mass — “What emotions did you experience during the Mass and anointing?” (Helps them name feelings without deep abstraction.)

Moment that stayed with you — “What moment from the celebration has stayed with you the most?” (Encourages simple storytelling.)

Explaining Confirmation — “How would you explain Confirmation to a friend who has never received it?” (Concrete and accessible.)

Meaning of being confirmed — “What does being ‘confirmed’ mean to you now?” (Allows basic expression of understanding.)

Gratitude — “What are you most grateful for from this experience?” (Relatable and grounded in emotion.)
