Some Feast Days within Lent

While "feasting" is not particularly Lenten, there are a few special days in the Lenten calendar that merit *celebration*. Here are a few ideas to get you started.



March 17: Feast of St. Patrick

- Learn about St. Patrick <u>here</u>. (For kids, free <u>Veggie Tale video</u>, or purchase this <u>DVD</u>.)
- Pray the "Breastplate," a prayer attributed to St. Patrick. Or listen to it sung.
- St. Patrick used the shamrock to teach about the Trinity, pray the Sign of the Cross (our most common Trinitarian prayer) with extra attention. Cut out your own shamrocks to decorate.
- Make some traditional St. Patrick's Day foods, like Irish Soda Bread or Corned Beef & Cabbage.
- Listen to Irish music during dinner.



March 19: Solemnity of St. Joseph

- Learn <u>here</u> about St. Joseph and how his feast is celebrated around the world. Audio story for kids: <u>MP3 for purchase</u>. Adults may consider the 30-day <u>consecration to St. Joseph</u> or reading Pope Francis' letter about St. Joseph, <u>Patris Corde</u>. Add a <u>St. Joseph prayer</u> to mealtime grace.
- Place an image of St. Joseph in a prominent place in your home for the day.
- In honor of St. Joseph, a carpenter, tackle one of those "fix it" or "refurbishing" jobs around the house.
- Kids love crafts with wooden popsicle sticks.



March 25: Solemnity of the Annunciation

- Yes, this feast is nine months before Christmas! Read the <u>story</u> of the Angel Gabriel announcing to Mary that she would be the mother of God. Kids videos: <u>2 min</u>. and <u>30 min</u>.
- Pray the joyful mysteries of the rosary or learn about and pray the <u>Angelus</u>.
- Bring a meal to a family with a new baby or bring some baby supplies to a crisis pregnancy center or women's shelter.
- Play one of these <u>baby shower games</u> for kids.
