pastoral ministers. Today's health care practices and laws may lead parents to be misinformed about ALL the options and opportunities available to them when they receive the news that their unborn baby is likely to have disabilities.

Too often parents hear about genetic disorders only in negative terms with predictions for endless pain and suffering for the child and the extended family after birth. Euphemisms for abortion such as, early induction, medical termination, interruption of pregnancy and saying good-bye early may be presented as the only reasonable option.
