DEFINITIONS AND PURPOSE OF VICARIATE AND PARISH ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURES

PARISH: "A parish is a definite community of the Christian faithful established on a stable basis within a particular church; the pastoral care of the parish is entrusted to a pastor as its own shepherd under the authority of the diocesan bishop." It is the place where all the faithful can be gathered together for the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist. The parish initiates the Christian people into the ordinary expression of the liturgical life: it gathers them together in this celebration; it teaches Christ's saving doctrine; it practices the charity of the Lord in good works and brotherly love." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #2179).

Canon Law (c. 515.1) speaks of a parish in the following way: "A parish is a certain community of the Christian faithful stably constituted in a particular church, whose pastoral care is entrusted to a pastor (parochus) as its proper pastor under the authority of the diocesan bishop".

Can. 518 goes on to state, "As a general rule a parish is to be territorial, that is, one which includes all the Christian faithful of a certain territory. When it is expedient, however, personal parishes are to be established determined by reason of the rite, language, or nationality of the Christian faithful of some territory, or even for some other reason."

PARISHIONER: "All Catholics who live within the territory of a parish are members of the parish. This means that they have the right to orderly access to the sacraments (if they are properly disposed), to personal ministration from the pastor or his agents, to preaching, to religious education, and to all the other ministerial benefits (e.g., Christian funeral) that the parish offers. This right is not contingent on financial support of the parish, on participation in the liturgical life of the parish, or on the fulfillment of any other requirement. While pastors should encourage Catholics within the boundaries of the parish to register, to offer their financial support, and to maintain a certain level of activity, the failure of a parishioner to register or otherwise participate in parish life does not allow the pastor to relegate that parishioner to any special category of membership (e.g. "inactive member")" (*Archbishop Pilarczyk*, 2009).

DEANERY: A geographic grouping of neighboring parishes. Deaneries help in the coordination of pastoral care, common pastoral action, mutual support in the implementation of diocesan policies, sharing of pastoral concerns, and facilitation of communication. The Bishop, after consultation with the Presbyteral Council, may establish, modify, combine or suppress Deaneries according to circumstances and pastoral needs. Deaneries are known in universal canon law as a "vicariate forane."

<u>**DEAN:**</u> The role of the Dean is primarily pastoral. By special appointment of the Bishop, the Dean shares in the Bishop's ministry as shepherd of the diocese. It is a position of guiding pastoral care for a particular area of the diocese with the Bishop's pastoral authority. As the Bishop's representative, the Dean works in close liaison and partnership with the Bishop, the Vicar General, and any other Episcopal Vicars and officers appointed by the Bishop. In carrying out his role, the Dean should give priority to affirming, encouraging and supporting the priests and deacons of the deanery.

The Dean is the Bishop's personal representative in the deanery, and can act in the name of the Bishop when he presides or is present at liturgical functions, meetings of clergy and/or lay people, local civic events, ecumenical activities, etc. The Dean is a servant of communion and channel of

communication among the pastors and parish communities within the deanery, and between the deanery and the Bishop.

Canon Law defines some of the duties of a Dean as:

- promotion and coordination of the common pastoral activity within the deanery;
- seeing that the clerics of the deanery lead a life in harmony with their state in life and perform their duties with diligence;
- · seeing that religious functions follow Church norms;
- seeing that the good appearance of churches and sacred furnishings are maintained;
- seeing that parish books are correctly managed;
- · seeing that the parish rectory is well maintained;
- seeing that clerics, following the norms of the diocese and the norms of Canon 272, attend theological lectures, meetings, or conferences;
- making sure that the priests of the deanery have access to spiritual helps and aid in difficult pastoral circumstances; and
- making sure that pastors in his deanery are well cared for when they are sick or dying.
- Additionally, the dean must follow the particular norms of the diocese. Canon 555 also
 particularly mentions that a dean must visit the parishes of the district in accord with the
 regulations made by the diocesan bishop.

<u>PARISH FAMILY:</u> A "Parish Family" or "Pastoral Unit" is an intentional grouping of individual parishes which vitalizes and supports the active faith life of all the parishioners and the evangelization of the Gospel. Each of these groupings exist within the geographical boundaries of a particular Vicariate or Deanery within the Diocese of Des Moines. This model is recognized and described by the Church in the following way:

- 42. The pastoral conversion of the Parish community, in terms of mission, takes shape and finds expression in a gradual process of a renewal of structures; consequently, different forms of shared pastoral care emerge, as well as forms of participation in it that involve the entire People of God.
- 43. Using language borrowed from Magisterial documents regarding subdivisions within the diocesan territory [49], new expressions have been added to those of Parish and Vicariates Forane (Deaneries), which are foreseen in the current Code of Canon Law^[50], namely "pastoral units" and "pastoral regions". These appellations effectively define new forms of pastoral organization within a Diocese, thus reflecting a new relationship between the faithful and the territory.
- 44. In using terms like "pastoral units" and "pastoral regions", naturally one does not envisage that by simply giving a new name to already existing realities, a myriad of current problems are overcome. At the heart of a process of renewal, instead of passively undergoing change by supporting and going along with it, there exists today the need to individuate new structures that will incite all those who make up the Christian community to fulfil their vocation to evangelize, with a view to a more effective pastoral care of the People of God, the "key factor" of which is proximity.
- 45. With this in mind, the canonical norm underlines the need to individuate different territories^[51] within each Diocese, with the possibility of these being assembled into intermediate realities between a given Diocese and an individual Parish. Furthermore, by

taking the size of the Diocese and its pastoral reality into account, one is better situated to delineate various kinds of Parish groupings^[52].

The communal dimension of the Church lives and works at the heart of these groupings, with particular attention given to specific territories, the establishment of which must take into consideration the homogeneity and customs of the inhabitants, together with the common traits of the area, in order to foster a close relationship between Parish Priests and other pastoral workers^[53].

Therefore, this "Parish Family" or grouping of parishes could cooperate in the following:

- 1. Pastoral Planning for Common Mission:
 - a. Identifying common pastoral needs
 - b. Discerning and Developing a common Mission/Vision for the grouping
 - c. Articulating and Executing Common Goals for living out the Mission
- 2. Shared staffing for ministry and administration
- 3. Shared opportunities for ministry, evangelization, and outreach to those in need
- 4. Pastoring/Governance:
 - a. Could have multiple Pastors for individual parishes or groups of parishes as is done currently,
 - b. Could have a singular Pastor, with several Parochial Vicars (Curates),
 - c. Could have a singular Pastor with Parochial Vicars and/or Directors of Parish Life at some locations (Can. 517.2).


