### APPLY FOR AN ESA BEFORE JUNE 30!

families Eligible who submit application before the June 30 deadline will receive \$7,826 per child in ESA funds to use toward enrollment at an accredited school. ESA funds non-public renewable annually, roll over, and remain available until high school graduation or age 20. For the 2024-2025 school year, all incoming kindergarteners and current public school students qualify for an ESA. Many families already enrolled in Catholic schools may also qualify for an ESA based on income. By 2025-2026, All K-12 students in Iowa will qualify for an ESA, regardless of income. Although he retired before Karissa's high school tenure, his legacy thrived through her family's continued dedication to the sport.

The family's connection to Dowling's track program runs deep, with Karissa's father and uncles. Steve and Doug, leaving their own tracks on the school's history. Even her siblings, Kelsey and Ryan, followed suit, lacing up their shoes to represent Dowling on the track. Ryan's athletic prowess shone brightly as he clinched impressive state championships, eight including a swimming title. His achievements extended beyond high school, as evidenced by his stellar performance at the 2017 USA Track and Field Junior Championships, where he secured third place with a remarkable 3:49.04 PR in the 1500m event. He's a valued member of the University of Notre Dame's track team.



### COMMUNITY UNITES TO BUILD A SCHOOL CHAPEL

In the summer of 2023, Principal Gretchen Watznauer of St. Theresa Catholic School had a visionary idea: to transform an unused classroom into a serene sanctuary, a place for students, teachers, and staff to find solace and connection through prayer. Fast forward to March 26, 2024, and that vision became a reality as Bishop William Joensen blessed the newly minted Little Flower Chapel, consecrating its altar and sanctifying its sacred space.

Principal Watznauer's aspiration for a chapel within the school was born out of a desire for accessibility and intimacy in moments of prayer, especially during the bustling school day. Her dream took flight with the support of parish figures like Father Raphael Assamah, Kenneth Seymour, the parish business manager, and Tony Tedesco, the facilities director.

The journey from concept to blessing was a collaborative effort, with Father Trevor Chicione, the diocesan Vicar for Divine Worship, providing invaluable guidance. Tedesco, alongside dedicated volunteers Thomas McMahon, Jon Thill, and Denny Koenigsfeld, poured countless hours into crafting the chapel into the serene haven it is today.





The chapel's creation came at minimal cost, thanks to the community's generosity. Pews were donated by a church in Des Moines and meticulously restored by a crew of volunteer workers. Parishioner Mike Tigges lent his expertise to repair the drywall, while McMahon contributed a restored crucifix. The Seymour family's donation of woodcarved Stations of the Cross adorns the chapel walls, a poignant reminder of Christ's sacrifice.


Tedesco's thoughtful touches, including small lights illuminating the stations and creating a calming ambiance, added to the chapel's ambiance. Watznauer contributed a marble holy water font, ciborium, and chalice, while Molly Tedesco, curated altar cloths and even handcrafted additional sets. The chapel's adornments, from a statue of St. Therese to salvaged stained glass windows, were lovingly donated by members of the school community, each adding a layer of significance to the sacred space.
